HAZARDOUS WASTE COLLECTION

The District's household hazardous waste collection season is well underway, but there's still time to rid your home of toxic products and wastes before winter. Fluorescent light bulbs and mercury thermometers, lawn and garden chemicals, oil paints and many household cleaning products need to be handled carefully and disposed of as hazardous waste.

The Central Vermont Solid Waste Management District's seasonal hazardous waste collections are held the second Saturday of each month, May through October. The remaining dates are September 8 and October 13 from 10 am to 1 pm at the CV Transfer Station on US 2 in East Montpelier.

Disposal costs will be \$.65 per pound of oil-based paint and paint products (no latex paint) and \$1.25 per pound of other hazardous waste. Please note: Pesticides are accepted free of charge.

Top of the Signpost

Some 250 years ago, when our independence from England was far from assured, Benjamin Franklin developed his personal vision of the kind of country he wanted ours to be. He conceived of three simple steps to forming an orderly democratic republic: creating "virtuous" citizens, forming small groups with a common purpose to work toward a common goal and creating networks which might grow out of these groups.

The history books are full of examples of how Franklin carried out these principles in his city of Philadephia: helping establish a hospital, an insurance company, libraries, a college, sanitation programs and police departments. Perhaps best known is the image of Franklin passing the leather bucket in the fire brigade which he realized could fight one of the biggest terrors of 18th century life - FIRE.

OUR FIRE DEPARTMENT — A SHORT HISTORY Elliott Morse

To write the history of the East Montpelier Fire Department, we must go back and see why a local department was needed. The towns of East Montpelier and Calais in 1960 were principally agricultural. Their farms had large barns, many of them attached to the house and sometimes to several outbuildings. If one of these structures was engulfed in flames, fire might spread to the rest, leaving nothing but the cellarhole. The threat of spontaneous combustion of hay, lightning or sparks from farm equipment was a constant threat.

At this time, the Montpelier Fire Department was the closest organization to call. But the distance they travelled and the factthat they were a city department, set up to acquire water from hydrants, left East Montpelier with little sense of security. Rural settings had no hydrants. Both Calais and East Montpelier had contracts with the city for fire protection. The contracts allowed the city to send out one pumper truck and a couple of men.

In 1964, Montpelier raised its per hour rate to \$500, more than double what it had been!

One morning in the early spring of 1964 Bob Simon, a full time Montpelier firefighter, stopped at our barn on the County Road. He knew I had an interest in forming a fire department, and, with the outrageous price hike, now seemed like the time. On May 18, a meeting was held with 17 townspeople attending. Harry Morse made the motion to organize an East Montpelier Fire Department. Of these 17 first members, some served for years, while others helped organize and gradually withdrew. The group included Jim Hudson, Carroll Badger, Austin Cleaves, Marshall Hodgeman, Henry Brazier, Bob Webster, Curt Campbell, Percy Davis, Steve Hale, Elliott Morse, Bob Simon, Gordon Sevene, Dave Palmer, Harry Morse, Bob Parker, Bernard Corliss and Bernard Morse. Fast forward to the 21st century. Disastrous fires are as fearsome today as they were in the eighteenth century. Only the equipment has changed. Thankfully, Franklin's vision of a community banding together to fight fires is alive and well today. Local fire departments are perhaps the best example in our modern world of how communities work together with a common purpose and a common goal. As in Ben Franklin's time, there is no compensation, no reward beyond the satisfaction of service given.

It is with pride and appreciation that the *Signpost* salutes our East Montpelier Fire Department, as we cover their story in this issue.

The new department held meeting after meeting. Bob Simon became our Chief and held that position for the next 16 years. We acquired some basic equipment. Seguin's Heating Oils donated an aged fuel tanker, which was painted bright red and hand lettered by Joe Tofani of Honest John's auto emporium. Indeed, the first fire to which our tanker responded was somewhat accelerated by fuel oil still in the hose! We were befriended by Dave Dean, a fire equipment dealer from Springfield, Mass. He offered us what we needed and declared that we could pay him when we had the money. He located a 1938 Ford pumper for us in North Springfield, VT, which some members proceeded to drive back on trial. That very night, Jim Goodall's house caught on fire. The little pumper ran all night, and the next day we became the proud owners.

We were asked by Calais if we could provide protection for them. In the resulting contract, Calais would pay us \$150 per hour for one pumper, one tanker, and manpower. Since that time the arrangement between towns has shifted, with Calais now paying a share based on the department's call volume and receiving unlimited service. From the beginning, many of our firefighters were from Calais, and two of our past Chiefs, Lester Toby and Mike Garand, are Calais men.

Capital Mutual Aid was soon organized, and we became a member. This meant that we could call upon several other towns for assistance at emergency situations. In return, we offered assistance to our neighbors. Twenty eight towns are now members.

Every fire department needs a permanent heated home. After a couple of uncertain years in donated space, we built a station. Alice Chapell donated land on Templeton Road, and the town gave us \$5000 for materials. The summer of 1967 was a busy one as we put up our own station. In 1988, Station One was expanded, and now we have Station Two in East Village, thanks to space donated by Washington Electric Coop.

Prior to 1978, we were strictly a Fire Department, but we saw the need for medical and rescue services. Several people took Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) training. Others became Emergency Care Attendants (ECAs). These "first responders" made up our Fast Squad. We added a used rescue truck and later equipped it with the Jaws of Life, a hydraulic extrication tool. Today the Department has three times as many rescue calls as fire calls.

East Montpelier Fire and Rescue has, thanks to town support, become a well trained, well equipped organization. We average 30 members, with ongoing recruitment. We have a new pumper truck, a new rescue truck, two older pumpers, two tankers, and a brush truck.

Every fire department has triumphs and tribulations. We've saved many homes, but sometimes it is too late and causes us heartache. Our biggest loss was the early morning fire that claimed the life of our Assistant Chief, Bob Parker. But other emergencies end happily. In an earlier fire, a house on Chickering Road was engulfed in flame. Firefighter Gus Seelig entered the building only to disappear through the floor. Assistant Chief Parker reached down and with incredible strength hoisted Gus out, thus saving his life.

As East Montpelier and Calais grow, we see greater need for emergency services. We continue to meet changes in technology, equipment and skills. And - we even have our own web page: www.sovernet.net/~emfd/. Look us up!

FIRE!! by Elliott Morse

The alarm goes off. You hurry to the fire station, jump into a truck, and speed to the site. As you drive, you are formulating a plan in your head. Now you're there, and smoke is already showing from the building, but your first job is to check for trapped occupants. You're remembering the terrible days before firefighters had self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBAs). Now with the outside personnel and fire lines ready, you can enter the building — never one person alone, but from two to four men wearing SCBAs. Inside there is a constant crackling and every little while the bang of something falling. Smoke is choking thick, and in the distance you can see a faint glow. The hose is advanced, a small fire is put out, and all the while you search for trapped victims. Thankfully there are none. Now the men can assess the situation and attack the fire.

Years ago, we responded to a Mutual Aid fire at the Capitol Apartments in Montpelier. This building had a very long corridor, and the far end apartment was burning. With no SCBAs, our general rule was to crawl on the floor beneath the smoke and use the hose lines for escape. Unfortunately this time a fireman from another department put water through a hole in the roof into the fire, forcing fire and smoke onto our men. Suddenly our world was black with choking smoke. Rule One — drop down, follow the hose line, and please, oh please, don't let go. Slowly, oh so slowly we made it to the outside fresh air. In this instance, the men had gotten so much smoke that they became physically sick. This is what fighting a fire is like.



What does it cost to operate a small town Fire Department?

The East Montpelier Fire Department, unlike in many towns in Vermont, is private and must create its own budget. It receives town funds for its operating expenses (divided one quarter Calais, three quarters East Montpelier) but raises money itself for some of its equipment. Thus it depends on a number of fund raising projects conducted by the firefighters and its auxiliary.

Here are a few sample expenses:

- Insurance (over 2 million liability) -\$26,500/year
- Pagers for each member \$400 each
- SCBAs (they own 8) \$3100 each
- Coat/boots/helmet for each \$1800
- Dispatch service (Capital West) -\$6800/year(when you dial 911, it rings into the Montpelier F.D.)

A FEW GOOD MEN - some of the leaders past and present

Bob Simon—It was at Bob's suggestion that the Department was formed in 1964. He was elected Chief at the organizational meeting and served for 16 years. Bob started with the Montpelier Fire Department in 1953, when he was still in high school, and stayed with that department until 1966. It was the organization of the Department and building the first station that gave Bob the greatest sense of accomplishment. He is very proud that, although the early days were difficult, the results were most rewarding.

Tom Brazier has been Chief of the Department since last year. He joined as a Junior Firefighter in 1973, having grown up close to the scene. His dad, Henry, has been a fireman since the early days. Tom's big plan for the F.D. is pre-planning for possible emergencies in the town's larger buildings, to know their layouts, observe likely hazards, figure escape routes, etc.

Mike Garand is Deputy Chief, a veteran of more than 29 years and has been Chief as well as almost every other job in the F.D. He notes that F.D.'s work includes structure fires, heavy rescue, vehicle accidents, search and rescue in the woods, EMS, water rescue, and "wild land fire suppression" (grass fires to us). Mike is from Calais and is also our town Road Foreman.

Elliott Morse was a charter member, along with Bob Parker, Henry Brazier, Bernard Corliss, (perhaps others; he wasn't sure, after 37 years). He became the second Chief, after Bob Parker's early years, is currently Assistant Chief, and has done most of the jobs. (Right now he provides the *Signpost's* link with F.D. archives.)

Bill George has been a firefighter for 32 years, about 24 of them in East Montpelier. Bill began as a "firefighter" and has moved up in the organization to Captain. He is also an instructor in fire science and teaches all over the state. He notes his other specialty as "paper work".

Jon Winston joined the F.D. in 1980 and filled many offices including Chief before Tom Brazier. He was for 10 years chair of the district EMT service. He feels that his specialty was to help bring a strong Emergency Medical component to the F.D. through the CVMC and also to research firefighting equipment and training.

East Montpelier Trails recently opened the Esther Salmi Trail, a short spur connecting the Town Forest Trail (Fire Station to Haggett Rd.) with County Road. The trail runs eastwest just south of Haggett Rd. and follows the VAST trail. It joins the Town Forest Trail at the new Esther Salmi memorial.

Together with the East Montpelier Gully Jumpers snowmobile club and with support from VAST, we also recently acquired a parcel of land at the trailhead on the railroad bed leading east from VT 14 south of East Montpelier village. This acquisition permanently protects access to this section of the Cross Vermont Trail. We are working closely with Cross Vermont on plans to extend the trail to join with the Montpelier section.
